## **Project Description**

Infill sidewalks located near transit stops. Improvements will connect Ped facilities on six (6) roadway segments to complete Ped facilities to transit. Segments are as follows:

- Booth Street ADT 1,902
- Greenwood Avenue (Bridge St. to Westholm Park) ADT 824
- Greenwood Avenue (Bridge St. to Brownell Ave.) ADT 803
- E and F Street ADT 5,733
- Mill Street ADT 507
- 8<sup>th</sup> Street ADT 312

### Analysis

Implementation of this project will impact  $PM_{10}$  & CO emissions. The analysis will examine reductions in  $PM_{10}$  and CO emissions.  $PM_{10}$  emission factors and CO emission factors for vehicles and paved roadways are derived from the Federal Highway Administration Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvements Tool.

### Assumptions used in this analysis:

- 1. Volume (ADT) = 10,081
- 2. Adjusted Volume (ADT) = 504 (based on 5% mode/shift reduction of 10,081 ADT)
- 3. Trip Length (miles) = 2 (Estimated MPO average vehicle trip length)
- 4. VMT (ADT \* Trip Length) = (504\*2) = 1,008 daily VMT reduced
- 5. Days of use = 365


